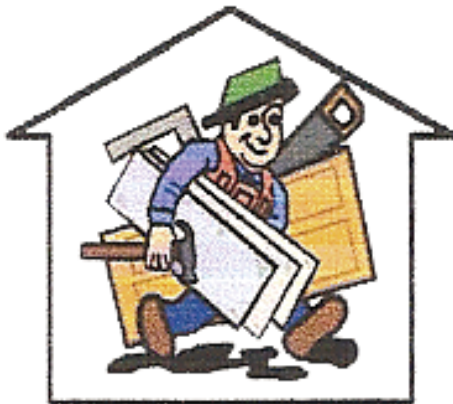
Housing Rehabilitation Program

Check into this program. Qualified applicants may be eligible for a deferred payment loan of up to \$35,000. The 0% interest, deferred payment loan is secured by a mortgage placed on your property. The amount loaned is due and payable upon the sale or transfer of your property.

Do you think you make too much money to qualify?



A family of two can have a gross income of \$47,350 and a family of four is \$59,200. These are rather generous income levels.

Federal Tax Provision Offers Landowners Incentive to Protect Their Land

Last year, Congress voted to extend a tax provision that offers landowners around the country a generous tax deduction to permanently protect their land. For folks who own land with important natural or historic resources, this provision can provide potentially significant federal tax benefits for donating a conservation restriction or agricultural preservation restriction on that land, or for donating a portion of the value of a restriction sold through the state's Agricultural Preservation Restriction (APR)

program. This benefit, however, is available only through the end of 2009, unless extended by Congress.

In a nutshell, the current federal conservation tax incentive allows a landowner who donates a conservation or agricultural preservation restriction on their land to deduct the full value of that gift from their federal income taxes over a sixteen year time period, limited annually to 50% of the landowner's adjusted gross income. If a landowner qualifies as a full-time farmer (making more than 50% of his or her annual income from farming), they can deduct up to 100% of their annual adjusted gross income from their federal income taxes.

Here's an example: A landowner has annual gross income of \$50,000 from non-farming sources, and donates a conservation restriction valued at \$500,000 to a local land trust. He would be entitled to a federal tax deduction of \$25,000 in the year of his gift, and, assuming his annual gross income remains at \$50,000, could deduct \$25,000 against his federal income taxes each year for an additional fifteen years, for a total tax deduction of \$400,000.

If that same landowner earned more than 50% of his \$50,000 annual gross income from farming, he would be entitled to deduct the full \$50,000 from his federal income taxes in the year of the gift. Assuming his annual gross income remained \$50,000, he could continue to take an annual deduction of \$50,000 for the next nine years, at which point he would have reached the full value of his \$500,000 restriction. If his restriction were valued at \$1,000,000, he could take a \$50,000 deduction for the full sixteen years, for a total deduction of \$800,000.

In the case of a "bargain sale" through the state APR program—where a landowner donates a portion of the value of the restriction—the same rules would apply. The landowner could deduct



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the full value of the donated portion of the restriction over a sixteen year period, up to 100% of the landowner's annual gross income.
