

#### <u>Gratitude of So Deerfield Family Boosts</u> <u>VFW Mission</u> by Quint Dawson

The family of WW II US Navy veteran Charles F. Sadoski II of South Deerfield, expressed gratitude to VFW Post 3295 for their "extreme kindness" in paying tribute to him at his funeral and burial in February. Sadoski was known for singing God Bless America at area events, and once at Fenway Park. On March 12th several family members appeared at a VFW meeting to present a generous check and a letter, which said in part: "we donate this money so that this Post is able to use this gift to help other deserving veterans. . . "

About a dozen Post members in uniform attended Mr. Sadoski's wake at the house where he was born and lived his whole life. "Our family was so deeply moved by the dignity, respect and honor you paid to our dad and grandad," the letter continued. "On a very sad day for our family you provided comfort to all of us."

The Post's Honor Guard fired a rifle salute the following day at Mr. Sadoski's internment, while active US Navy personnel folded and presented the family with the American Flag that draped the casket.

Roland Kinsman, Commander of Post 3295 said "We believe that every person who served honorably in the US armed services deserves this kind of tribute when they pass on. We will do our best to be there for any family that asks us to come."

Dog Licenses: Just a reminder that all dogs need to be licensed by June 1st or a \$25 late fee will apply. You will need to provide a valid rabies certificate in order to license. Dog licenses are \$5 for a spayed or neutered dog and \$10 for an unaltered dog. Dogs can be licensed by mail by sending the correct payment along with a valid rabies certificate and a stamped self-addressed envelope to Town Clerk, P. O. Box 89, Whately, MA 01093. Dogs can be licensed online by going to www.whately.org and clicking on "Order Vital Records and Dog Licenses Here". You can use your bank account to pay with no

fee or a credit card with a fee of \$2.50. You may also license in person at the Town Clerk's Office in the Center School Offices at 218 Chestnut Plain Road during regular business hours. Please call 665-0054 for hours.

Town Elections will be held on Tuesday, June 2, 2012 at the Town Hall from 10 a.m. – 7 p.m. Absentee Ballots

will be available for those who will be out of town, physically unable to make it to the Town Hall, or have religious reasons for not being able to vote that date. Applications for absentee ballots must be received before Noon on Monday, June 11, 2012. However, keep in mind that you must return the ballot to the Town Clerk before the close of polls on election day. A copy of the warrant for this election will be posted at the Town Hall, Center School Offices, Post Office, Library and the Town of Whately website www.whately.org by May 24, 2012.

#### Town Hall Building Assessment



In April of 2011, Whately Town Meeting, at the advice and guidance of the town's Community Preservation Committee supported a proposal to assess the capacity of our town hall and also evaluate whether this 1844 building could adequately support not only the current but also the town's future administration needs in order for the town to function properly.

We are glad to report that earlier this year, the Building Committee hired the firm of Margo Jones Architects of Greenfield to perform this building assessment. As part of the selection process, the Committee received 11 bids from an RFP that was widely distributed. We were very impressed with a number of bids and ultimately interviewed three firms. Without question, Margo Jones Architects, which is also the firm that drafted the plans for the Whately Elementary School, stood out above the rest. Shortly after the Board of Selectmen made the offer and a contract was signed between the Town and Margo Jones our work began.

Because we are using CPA funds, our scope of work is limited to what the potential is for Town Hall. Many people in town know the building needs a lot of work. For those who are unfamiliar with the present state of the building, we encourage you to visit and get a firsthand understanding of its deficiencies and also its unique charm.

What is unknown to all of us

is what the building could do and at what cost. That was the challenge we gave to Margo Jones Architects in our first meeting. What they come up with and then how that compares to other options will determine the recommendations we take to a Town Meeting in the future.

Having been a part of these meetings over the past several months, it is now clearer than ever that we are doing the right thing with this Town Hall needs assessment. Running a town is supposed to deliver services to the people in the most efficient and cost effective manner. And the meetings we have had to date have been a constant reminder that we are not currently efficient and we would be more efficient with all town administrative and professional staff in one location.

As we all know, people in town go to one building to get things like permits, various types of licenses, including dog licenses and also to register to vote. We go to another building to pay our taxes, talk with assessors or attend a small meeting or hearing. And still, we go to another building for any meeting with an attendance above 30. If we guess wrong and hold a meeting that is better attended than we anticipated and hold it in the current town hall, many town's people sit in obstructed view seats as if they were sitting at Fenway Park. It is simply not the way government should run and be in the best interests of people and critical service delivery.

So as we are deep in the middle of spring, the building committee is meeting on a regular basis with the team of architects and we are evaluating concepts, plans and discussing what is adequate and what is not. We are putting a lot of work into this process, but it is very important work that will provide us with great vision in the weeks and months to come.

We all agree that we can't wait to present to the entire town what we have found and what we are recommending.

Therefore, we have TENTATIVELY schedule a public forum to discuss this assessment on Thursday, June 21st at 7:00am at the Elementary School. We will present our capacity needs, our current building realities, a potential plan for a renovated town hall, and concepts for a new town hall. With all that needs to be discussed and decided we

hope the whole town turns out to learn, share thoughts and be a part of the solution to our current town hall needs.

In the near future we will confirm this date, time and location. So, stay tuned!

<u>Wildlife Sightings</u> by Marianne Simon

The beavers have constructed a beautiful, strategically located pond on Westbrook Road, opposite the storage facility. They obviously learned a lesson (if this sounds like I'm anthropomorphizing, I am) from their cousins, who flooded an enormous area just a bit further west, on both sides of the same street, a few years ago. Unfortunately, they were unaware that their location was almost at street level, so that when the rains fell, the street flooded. What was more distressing, at least to me, was that the water washed away all the marsh marigolds that decorated the edges of the streams there. But, of course, what mattered intensely to commuters was that Westbrook Road became unnavigable during rainy weather. Therefore the town road crew was alerted, the beaver dams were

breached, and the beavers evicted, mortally, I suspect.

Well, this time the beavers sent their engineer-in-chief to find a site that would not inconvenience anyone, and sure enough, she found one. It is well below the street level, there are no marsh marigolds to wash away (though it may unroot an apple tree), and it has become a glorious wildlife refuge. They've built a lovely lodge, created a broad pond that now supports mellifluous tree frogs, ducks, kingfishers, and is a very pleasant fishing spot for the magnificent great blue heron who occupies our area each spring and summer. There are probably other creatures benefitting from this engineering feat, as well. I'll report as I see them, and I hope you will, too.
