## Attention Whately Farmers and Farmland Owners by Bill Obear

The Whately Agricultural Commission will be hosting a Farmland Information meeting on Saturday March 13<sup>th</sup> at the town hall from 1 to 3 PM. The purpose of this meeting is to acquaint Whately's farming community with the activities of its Agricultural Commission, since it's establishment by the select board in 2006, and provide brief overviews of farmland protection strategies. Nathan L'Etoile, Assistant Commissioner of the Massachusetts Department of Agricultural Resources, will summarize the state laws (Chapters 61, 61A, 61B) that temporarily protect farmland, forestland and open space as well as the Agricultural Preservation Restriction (APR) law that provides permanent protection through the sale of development rights. Other issues including an overview of proposed Whately zoning changes to benefit farmland and open space protection will also be discussed. It is hoped that this meeting will be the beginning of a long-term dialogue between the Agricultural Commission and the town's farming community. Everybody is invited to bring their questions and ideas. Refreshments will be provided.

## Do you understand the proposed zoning changes?

Come to the March 30 public meeting, learn and be heard.

The Planning Board is holding a public hearing on Tuesday, March 30 at 6 pm to explain and receive comments on the zoning changes it is proposing. The changes will encourage development that protects farmland and open space and incorporates more affordable housing.

Land and lots along existing roads would not be affected by the proposed changes. The proposals would create a second residential zoning district for new subdivisions on back land and would require larger lot sizes for those areas. They would also amend the cluster development bylaw to require that more open space be set aside and to allow density 'bonuses' if a cluster subdivision includes additional open space, affordable units, elderly housing, or other benefits to the town.





**Whately's Heritage Landscape Inventory Report – Part 2, Priority Heritage Landscape #1: Whately Center** by Judy Markland & Howard Nenner, Historical Commission

We in Whately have long known the historic importance of our town center, so it is no surprise that the recent 2009 Heritage Landscape Inventory Report noted that we have identified it as the most worthy of preservation. (See the last edition of the *Scoop* or view the *Report* online at [whately.org/library](http://whately.org/library)) Accordingly, the *Report* gave Whately Center its highest priority for preservation. The *Report*, with photos, a map, and a fascinating discussion of the most important aspects of Whately Center is available at the library, town hall, or on the resources page at [whatelyhistorical.org](http://whatelyhistorical.org). It is well worth reading.

Among the *Report's* major points is that Whately Center was chosen as a Priority Heritage Landscape because of its role as the "civic core of the community," specifically citing Chestnut Plain Road, the Town Pound, Town Hall, Post Office, Library, Center School (town offices), Center Cemetery, the Whately Inn, and the Whately Water District. Again, no surprise as much of Chestnut Plain Road and Haydenville out from the town center have already been listed on the State and National Registers of Historic Places and designated by the town as Scenic Roads.

Still, designating Whately Center as worthy of preservation does little to preserve the buildings and viewscapes, which constitute our town's historic core. Therefore, the following recommendations have been made:

Consider creating a Local Historic District to preserve the exterior of historic buildings in the area. The Historical Commission would be happy to help residents of this area learn how to accomplish this.

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

funds to preserve, repair and upgrade Town Hall, the Library and the Whately Center School building and to preserve the Historical Society artifacts.

Consider the adoption of a Demolition Delay Bylaw that will allow for the pursuit of alternatives to demolition of historic buildings.

The town should initiate discussions with the current owners of the land around the library to explore options for protecting the land from development to protect views.

The Whately Water District should continue efforts to secure ownership or control of the land in the Zone I of their third well.

Consider updating the Town's Master Plan and explore the efficient use and reuse of public buildings, including parking needs.

Each is important and all deserve our support.

### **Community Preservation Act Update**

In January, Stuart Saginor of the Community Preservation Coalition held a training session for Whately's newly-formed Community Preservation Committee. We learned that we have a lot to do.

Our first task is to develop a plan for the town, outlining goals for the three primary areas of funding: historic preservation, open space and affordable housing. We'll need to review town reports like the Open Space Report, meet with key town boards and committees to learn their priorities, and hold a public hearing. We also must develop criteria for CPA projects and application forms to help explain what types of projects are eligible and what will be required as part of a project application. We've started reviewing the plans and meeting with the town boards.

If you have ideas and input for the CPA plan, please contact any of the committee members

listed below. You can find a grid that explains project eligibility under the state rules for CPA funding at the town web site.

Whately's CPA tax collections for this fiscal year are estimated at roughly \$62,000, and we anticipate that the state match in October will be close to this amount. We expect to be asking for project proposals in the fall.

## 2010 TRANSFER STATION CALENDAR

The Waste Management Committee invites you to recycle as many items as possible to save you and the Town money. We have a new Transfer Station Calendar (see below) featuring the many ways you can recycle items and dispose of trash.

**Batteries**—rechargeable and non-rechargeable. **Also cell phones & batteries; laptop, camera and power tool batteries.** Drop in battery recycling box—see attendant for details.

**Books**, etc Drop off any books, audio books, CDs, DVDs, records/LPs, sports cards, old video games, computer software—free—into the Got Books container next to the ramp.

**Compost** Drop food waste only in collection containers next to the book container.

**Fluorescent lights/bulbs** —Drop off in swap shed box. See attendant for details. Small fees charged. NO broken bulbs please!

**Plastic Bags All types, must be clean, dry and have no paper inside or sticky labels** (tear them off even if bag rips). Drop into plastic bag container. See attendant for details.

**Sharps Collection** For those who use needles for personal health, get free collection boxes at (and return to): Whately Health Center, 181 State Rd., **Mon., Wed., Fri. 9-12 only.**

**Thermometers** Drop mercury-filled thermometers ONLY in special box - see attendant.



**Brush Chipping – May 1 & June 5 only, 8 a.m.-Noon.** Bring brush up to 6" in diameter and free of nails and dirt, but **NO** leaves, grass, or construction debris. Wood chips available afterwards for landscaping.

**Swap Shed – First Saturday of the month, May 1 – Nov. 6, 8 a.m. - 1 p.m.** Bring only useful household items, sporting goods, and small toys, etc. – NO exercise equipment please. Take items you can use free. All items must be in good condition & re-usable or will be rejected. PLEASE be considerate, don't bring or leave broken junk or parts! Thanks.

**\* Spring Bulky Waste Collection day - May 8, 8 a.m. - 1 p.m.** For old furniture, stoves, freezers & refrigerators—**DOORS MUST BE REMOVED FIRST**, mowers, BBQ tanks, computers and TV's, furniture, metal items, air conditioners, bicycles, beds, radios, tires & more. Fees charged for most items to cover costs.

**Hazardous Waste Collection day, Sept. 25** at various sites. Bring toxic materials like motor oil, pesticides and solvents, etc. Pre-registration required, call 772-2438.

**\* Fall Bulky Waste Collection Day Oct. 16, 8 a.m. - 1 p.m.** Same as spring bulky day above, so bring all the rest of your stuff you forgot.

**Please note: Only trash in Town of Whately bags will be accepted – still the best deal in Town at only \$2 for a 33 gal. trash bag!**

**Dog Licenses are available.** A valid rabies certificate and the appropriate fee will be required to license your dogs. Intact Males and Females are \$10.00, spayed females and neutered males are \$5.00. Licensing may be done in person at the Town Clerk's Office, 218 Chestnut Plain Road during regular office hours or by mail. You may also license by mail by sending the rabies certificate and a check made payable to the Town of Whately for the applicable fee to Town Clerk, P. O. Box 89, Whately, MA 01093. All dogs must be licensed by June 1, 2010 to avoid a late fee. Late fees will be \$25 per dog after June 1 and before July 15<sup>th</sup>. After July 15<sup>th</sup> fees will increase to \$50 per dog.
