Health Care Reform Summary

Fellow Whately folks, healthcare reform is pretty confusing. The national physician's alliance Doctors for America, of which I am a part, has compiled this FAQ sheet:

How does Health Reform Affect You?

If you are insured now through a large employer, you can keep your current plan. Premiums are projected to stay the same or slightly decline.

If you are insured now through a small employer you can keep your current plan. Premiums are projected to slightly decrease. The new health reform law provides tax credits to small businesses starting this year to help them afford health coverage for employees.

If you are insured now through Medicare, you can keep what you have. The new health reform law does not cut guaranteed traditional Medicare benefits, and you get \$250 if you fall in the prescription drug 'Doughnut Hole' – it will be completely eliminated by 2020 and there are no

co-pays for preventive services.

If you purchase insurance on your own, you will pay 59% less on average than you currently do under the status quo.

If you are uninsured now and you just graduated from college, the new health reform law allows you to stay on your parents' health plans up to age 26.

If you are uninsured now and you lost your job or your employer does not cover you, new "exchanges" and new subsidies start in 2014 and will help middle class families purchase health insurance and keep premiums affordable.

If you are uninsured now and you have a pre-existing condition. The new health reform law bans insurance companies from denying you coverage based on pre-existing conditions in 2014, sets up high-risk pools in the meantime.

a Queen Anne maple tea table - and an envelope mailed from the East Whately post office on the day it closed.

We've also learned more about the value of our Whately pottery collection, as well as how capricious online auctions can be. 

Hazardous Waste Collection Sept. 25

The FCSWMD's annual hazardous waste collection will be on Saturday, September 25 at GCC Main Campus and Orange Transfer Station. It is free to Whately residents and offers a once-a-year opportunity to dispose of hazardous items such as oil-based paints, thinners, household cleaners, pesticides, pool chemicals, motor oil, antifreeze, car batteries, fluorescent lamps, and other household chemicals. It is an election year and the Town Clerk's Office is busy with election preparations. The State Primary will be held on September 14, 2010 from 7 a.m. – 8 p.m. at the Whately Town Hall. The State Election will be held on November 2, 2010. The last day to register to be eligible to vote in the November election is October 13th.

Reminder from the Tax Collector

Second quarter taxes are due on November 1, 2010. In July you received a mailing that had the bill for both August 1 and November 1. If you need the information on how much is due on November 1st, please contact Susan Warriner, Town Collector at 665-2595.

Housing Rehabilitation Program

This is a reminder that the Town of Whately still has grant funds for Housing Rehabilitation under the Community Development Block Grant for residents who qualify. The income guidelines are quite generous. For example, a household size of four can have an annual gross income of \$62,550. Under this program you may be eligible for a deferred payment loan of up to \$30,000 to \$35,000 for roofing and foundation repairs, heating systems, plumbing and electrical work, home modifications, septic repairs, lead paint removal and much more. Capital Stabilization Fund

The Selectmen have voted to bring the Capital Stabilization Fund override back for a vote of the town on the State Election ballot on November 2, 2010. As you may be aware the question was on the Town Election ballot in June but it did not pass. The Selectmen feel that there will be a larger turnout of voters for the Nov. 2 election and that will be a better indicator of how the residents feel on this issue. We have had many questions regarding the Capital Stabilization Fund since that June vote. The vote was quite close and we feel that with some additional information, residents may reconsider their position on this question. Let me explain the process. Presently the town does not have the money to purchase capital items. Every year we hope that the fiscal picture will improve and this year the Finance Committee, Capital Planning and Selectmen recognized that this was not going to happen and we needed to develop a way to replace equipment and repair buildings in disrepair. The Fire Station Roof is the only capital item that was funded this year (FY11) and the money was voted from the Regular Stabilization Account which after this vote now has \$200,000. We would like to see this account in the \$400,000 range. This particular account is used for emergency items. If one of our buildings required an emergency repair during the year this account would be used.

The Capital Stabilization Fund would serve as a savings account for items such as highway trucks, police cars, ambulances, etc. We are asking for \$60,000 to be funded through an override in order to start this savings account. A Capital Stabilization Fund override works a little different than a regular override. The \$60,000 once voted by the town on a ballot would be applied each year at the discretion of the Board of Selectmen. As we get caught up

on capital item purchases or if we have a new revenue source the Selectmen could chose to eliminate the override amount in any given year.

Although the Selectmen have the authority to appropriate the \$60,000 each year, Town Meeting with a 2/3rd's will vote on what items will be funded using the Capital Stabilization Fund. The Capital Improvement Planning Committee will make recommendations on what capital items should be funded each year.

Some may suggest that rather than having a Capital Stabilization Fund, we bring each item to a debt exclusion vote. The pros and cons to paying for capital items by a

debt exclusion are:


Pros to a debt exclusion rather than an override funded Capital Stabilization Account

- Residents are clear as to what the debt exclusion vote is to cover at the time of the appropriation. The item being purchased is specific.
- A debt exclusion has a limited time period (the length of the loan)

Cons to a debt exclusion rather than Capital Stabilization Account

- Tax rate will fluctuate with each of the capital item purchases which could make budgeting hard on the residents.
- The town will need to borrow over the length of the loan. The Capital Stabilization Account, on the other hand, will accrue interest as it grows rather than us paying interest towards a loan.
- It is more difficult to plan for future capital expenses without knowing there will be a funding source.

We hope you will think about this alternative method of funding for the larger capital items the town will desperately need in the next few years. If you have any questions about the Capital Stabilization Fund, please contact a member of the

Eco Friendly Whately Elementary

Whately Elementary School students and staff have set a goal to become the most eco-friendly school in Western Massachusetts. Do we have solar panels all over the roof to power the building? Well, not exactly. But when it comes to recycling and composting our food waste, we're in pretty good shape.

Our students receive regular lessons and reminders on the importance of recycling and how it supports a healthy ecology. We have appropriate recycling bins in all of our classrooms and offices. Our 6th grade students have taken on the job of collecting those bins and loading the material into our school-owned 96 gallon recycling toters.


Yes, we now own our very own toters thanks to a gift from Adam Quenneville Roofing and a new relationship with the Town of Whately Transfer Station and the Solid Waste Committee. Quenneville roofing was able to give our school a "rebate" after they replaced our old roof. Because Quenneville was able to recycle the old roof, they realized a cost savings and they kindly turned that savings back to us with the request that we use the money for a "green" initiative.



When the Town of Whately Transfer Station approached our school to see if we would be to discuss a way of recycling with the town rather than the private trash hauler we had been working with, we were very interested. In a nutshell, the transfer station agreed to provide pick-up at a great savings to us, and we agreed to purchase our own toters from the "green" money provided by Quenneville. As the school year begins, we are about to embark on the partnership.

Our school is also very fortunate to have a Whately neighbor who is dedicated to eco-friendly living and a friend of our school. Bill Obear, the proprietor of Bear Path Farm, where a huge composting operation takes place, is the man who shows up weekly to take away our toter

which is filled with the many food scraps from a week's worth of school lunches. Bill comes in his own truck, on his own time, using his own fuel money, and charges us a total of \$0 to take our food waste. And after having visited his farm with our 5th Grade last year, it's evident that what we provide to him is just a drop in the proverbial bucket relative to the size of his operation. Despite our small contribution of compost material, Bill collects our food waste because he believes it is the right thing to do. Bill also did a fantastic teaching job when he shared his expertise with our 5th graders last year as we walked around his farm surrounded by huge steaming rows of compost in various stages of decomposition! We learned a lot that day, this principal included, not just about composting but also about what it means to be a good neighbor like Bill Obear.



So with good neighbors like Bill Obear and the good folks at the Town of Whately Transfer station and Solid Waste Committee, and with our dedicated students and staff staying focused on "being green", I think we are well on our way to becoming the most eco-friendly school in Western Massachusetts and we have saved a few budget dollars along the way for the taxpayers. Sounds like a good deal to me!

Nasami Farm Nursery Opens for Fall Season

New England Wild Flower Society's Nasami Farm Nursery opens its 2010 Fall Season Thursday, September 2 and will remain open Thursdays through Sundays from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. until October 3. The Society's nursery propagates and sells over 450 native plant species at Nasami Farm in Whately and at Garden in the Woods in Framingham, MA. The nursery also grows large special orders for towns and landscapers.

For the first time, Nasami Farm will also offer a full-service garden shop with tools, containers, soil, and more. "We have had so many inquiries about the right tool for the right job that we decided to


stock some of our favorites," stated sales manager Terry Morrow. "Recycled plastic bottles make great garden gloves. Other items include branded clothing as tee-shirts, umbrellas, hoodies, caps, lanyards, water bottles, and holiday ornaments. There are also rugs made of recycled fishing ropes, a random selection of gardening books and children's books, composters and rain barrels made of recycled plastic, spouts you can put on water bottles for watering, towels made of bamboo and corn which can be washed and reused, gardener soaps, bug-off soaps, an all natural insect repellent, and recycled-plastic dust pan and broom sets. We are trying to be as green as possible with our shop merchandise."

Founded in 1900, New England Wild Flower Society, the nation's oldest native plant conservation organization, promotes the conservation of temperate North American flora through education, research, horticulture, habitat preservation, and advocacy. The Society owns and operates Garden in the Woods, a 45-acre public botanic garden in Framingham, MA, and Nasami Farm, a 75-acre native plant nursery in Whately, MA, as well as ten sanctuaries located in New England. The Society's vision is a future where vigorous native plant populations live in healthy, balanced, natural ecosystems—protected, enjoyed, and beneficial to all life.
