Have you noticed the changes and improvements to the offerings on our local public access channel 12? Perhaps you caught one of the live broadcasts of Frontier Basketball games from Goodnow gymnasium, with live commentary by Frontier students, including Whately residents Brad Bean, Matt Fortune, Andrew Futter and Mike Griswold? Maybe you noticed a little more variety in the programming, more local programs about local events and happenings in the towns. If you haven't yet, check us out next time you're channel surfing, you might be pleasantly surprised.

Our recent digital server installation has allowed us to make some big improvements to what we offer. The transition has not been problem free, and we are still working out the kinks, but it has allowed us to offer more programs per day in addition to the community bulletin board. Starting this month, we have access to and are beginning to broadcast free speech TV during certain hours.

However, one cannot broadcast with equipment alone. In addition to our regular community producers, such as Father Randy from the HNJ church, who makes the weekly Mass available on CH 12 each week, FCAT has built up a large crew


The Historical Society is busy recording new acquisitions and preparing for the 2011 exhibit which may be named "Early Agriculture in Whately".

### Farming In & Around Wetlands How to Stay Out of Trouble

The Agricultural Commission, and Conservation Commission will be jointly hosting a wetlands informational meeting on Thursday March 17th at the town hall from 7 to 9 PM.

As most farm operators know Farming In and Around Wetlands can be very challenging. If a mistake is made, it can be costly to correct. There is a fine line between normal field maintenance and



a potential wetland violation. Fortunately Whately has two local wetlands experts who

> have agreed to present their knowledge and perspectives on farming around wetlands.

Scott Jackson, a notable wetlands expert, is chair of the Whately Conservation Commission and works for the Department of Environmental Conservation at UMass. John Devine, whose family operates a 350 acre dairy farm in Hadley, is a member of the Whately Agricultural Commission and is the state compliance specialist for Farm Service Agency (FSA).

> This will be a very informal presentation. Those who are interested are encouraged to attend and talk with Scott and John about farming around

wetlands and how to stay out of trouble. Questions and discussion are encouraged.

### Whately Land Preservation

Whately Land Preservation (WLP) has been working to protect land in our town since 2003. affiliated with Franklin Land Trust, enabling your membership dollars and gifts to qualify as tax deductible charitable contributions. Please join WLP! And come to the annual meeting on March 20 and meet the board and other members.

Farms, forests, watershed and historic landscapes; Whately has them all, and in spite of what's going on around us. Even with our convenient location, our beautifully natural character, we have so far managed to maintain our rural identity and dignity. When WLP's founders began their work, they confronted many worthy acres with few helpful resources. While other towns and cities had caught on to the complicated process of attracting funds to help with planning and land protection, Whately had little history of attracting grants and other resources.

Where to begin? First, we defined the problem in terms of land use, narrowing it down to farms, forests, watershed and historic landscape. We then

WLP Board members knew from the start that the nature of land use planning and conservation makes setting priorities a changing process. Everyone knew, for instance, the tumultuous history of Whately's aquifers, the need to insure the future of our drinking water, and knew as well that irresponsible development over or around the aquifer could easily defeat this goal. When "for sale" signs appeared on an old farm located over our clearest aquifer, we found it reason enough to take action. That the property contained wetland, habitat for rare species and a beautiful vista, it became clear it was suitable for a major project, indeed, a case of Act now or lose the opportunity. Working with the Franklin Land Trust, and with the generous help of private philanthropy, and, of course, with the Commonwealth's Agricultural Protection Restriction program, we were able to help preserve the land. That WLP had previously led and supported the aquifer zoning project was no small help in the effort. Maple Hill Farm faced a major threat to farmland, habitat and drinking water and survived. It is WLP's biggest success to date.

**Batteries**—see related article.

**Books**, etc. Drop off any books, audio books, CDs, DVDs, records/LPs, sports cards, old video games, computer software—free—into the Got Books container next to the ramp.

**Food Waste**– Drop food waste only in collection containers next to the book container.

Fluorescent lights/bulbs – See attendant for details. NO broken bulbs please!

Plastic Bags – All types, but must be clean, dry and no paper inside or sticky labels (tear them off even if bag rips). Drop

into plastic bag barrel. See attendant for details.

**Thermometers** – Drop mercury-filled thermometers ONLY in special box - see attendant.

Thanks to the efforts of Whately residents in 2010 the Town saved about \$10,000 by recycling 45% of our waste!

### **Recycle Your Household Batteries**

Whately has a free battery and cell phone recycling program at transfer station. Please give used batteries and cell phones to the attendant. Batteries should not be put in the trash or regular recycling. Improper disposal of batteries can release mercury, cadmium or other heavy metals into our air and water, posing health threats to people and the environment.

Rechargeable batteries are in devices that can be recharged, i.e. cell phones, ipods, cordless phones, laptop computers, power tools, toys, digital cameras, and rechargeable toothbrushes, razors, flashlights, and handheld vacuum cleaners. Cell phones and other rechargeable batteries can also be recycled. We have a special box for these rechargeable batteries and cell phones. Free battery recycling is also available at Home Depot, Lowe's, and Radio Shack.

What to recycle:

Alkaline batteries such as AA, C, D and 9 volt Lithium batteries, most often in digital cameras Button batteries in watches, calculators and

SAFE MEDICATION SELF-MANAGEMENT GRANT:

In October 2010 Whately received a grant from Franklin County

Home Care Corporation (FCHCC) to help seniors in the towns of Deerfield, Sunderland and Whately manage their medications safely. In November, a "Green Bag Party", held at South County Senior Center kicked off the grant. Nurses and pharmacists were there to help. It was "very helpful" and "I learned a lot" according to the seniors who came. Another "Green Bag Party" event will be held from 9AM to 1PM at South County Senior Center on April 13. You are asked to put all your medications in a Green Bag (bags will be available at the Senior Center or Town Clerk's Office in Whately, beginning March 14) and bring it to the Senior Center April 13 where nurses and a pharmacist will help you sort and manage your medications. Refreshments, pillboxes and medication "diaries" will be available.

Also starting March 14, a nurse from Whately will begin visiting those elders in their homes who can't get out to the Senior Center to help them sort and manage their medications. Watch for fliers and other news or call Barbara Banik RN at 665-2497 for more information.

**Census forms** were mailed at the end of December. If you have not done so already, please return them to the Town Clerk's Office, 218 Chestnut Plain Road, P. O. Box 89, Whately, MA 01093. If you never received a form, please call the Town Clerk's office at 665-0054.

Dog Licenses are available. A valid rabies certificate and the appropriate fee will be required to license your dogs. Intact Males and Females are \$10.00, spayed females and neutered males are \$5.00. Licensing may be done in person at the Town Clerk's Office, 218 Chestnut Plain Road during regular office hours or by mail. You may also license by mail by sending the rabies certificate and a check made payable to the Town of Whately for the applicable fee to Town Clerk, P. O. Box 89, Whately, MA 01093. All dogs must be licensed by June 1, 2011 to avoid a late fee. Late fees will be \$25 per dog after June 1 and before July 15<sup>th</sup>. After July 15<sup>th</sup> fees will increase to \$50 per dog.


