Town Hall Straw Poll Results Announced

Throughout most of 2012, the Municipal Building Committee has been working hard to understand the building needs of our town government operations and the capacity that exists at Town Hall. This process was approved at our 2011 Annual Town Meeting and is a part of both realizing the most effective and efficient delivery of services from the town to its residents, while also determining the best possible solution to an under-utilized town hall.

Over the past several months we have worked to educate Whately residents about both of these items and at a public forum earlier this fall, combined with regular reports in the local newspapers we know that residents of Whately now have a much deeper understanding of our town needs and the capacity and potential of town hall.

With this information in mind, we ran a straw poll at the November 6th elections to ask town residents what direction they think the town should take for either a new town hall to be built on town property somewhere in Whately, or the renovation of the current town hall. Both options would satisfy the overriding need for additional office, storage and meeting space and to consolidate town offices in one building.

The results from the straw poll showed strong support for the renovation option. By a 2 1/2 to 1 ratio residents of Whately indicated that their preference would be to renovate and expand town hall to meet current and future town administrative needs. While the straw poll is not binding and more information is still needed, we believe that a vote that saw 402 residents support renovation and expansion, with 153 supporting a new town hall and 150 people needing more information is a sign that a strong majority of residents want the consolidation of town offices to include renovation and expansion of the current town hall. Though people should judge for themselves, some believe this result wasn't even close.

Over the coming weeks and months, the Municipal Building Committee will work closely with the Board of Selectmen to continue to educate the public on our progress and to set in motion a plan for next steps on office consolidation. More work still needs to be done and all options are still on the table, pending more research and information gathering.

This process will continue on December 19th at 7 p.m. in the Center School Offices with the

next meeting of the Municipal Building Committee. At this meeting, we will discuss next steps and determine other committees that will need to be involved in the next steps of the process.

All of our meetings are open to the public and we encourage your participation in this ongoing discussion.

Whately's First Solar Farm

Farming continues to dominate the Whately landscape in the flatlands of East Whately. But now a new kind of farming is springing up: harvesting electricity from sunlight; solar farms. The first solar farm is nearing completion and is located behind the town garage and transfer station.

Citizens Energy (CE), a nonprofit corporation whose primary business is providing lower cost heating oil to low income households, is developing approximately 10 of the 14 acre site by installing 7,156 monocrystalline photovoltaic panels each with a rated output of 250 watts. Peak capacity of the "farm" is about 1.8 megaWatts, which, over the course of a year, is expected to produce about 2.3 million kilowatt hours of electricity or, very approximately, the annual consumption of 350 households (or about half of Whately's residences). The DC electricity generated by the panels is inverted to 400 volt AC power then transformed up to 13.8 kilovolts and fed into the utility grid. The panels are warranted for a period of 25 years but should outlive that guarantee. The system is mounted on metal legs that extend below frost. At the end of its life, the system can be easily disassembled and trucked away.

CE is investing roughly \$7 million into the project. CE leases the land from a local family. CE earns energy sales credits from WMECO, which they then sell to the Franklin County Jail at a discount. CE also sells the solar renewable energy credits (SRECS) that it earns according to how much energy they generate. CE has multiple subsidiaries (their solar business being

Seems like not that long ago when we negotiated the current cable service contract for the town, but as my sister would say "that's what happens when you take off your coat!" - meaning - all of a sudden 7 years have passed and we are starting the cable contract negotiations again.

So much has happened since the last contract! Our last contract helped us get resources so that our local access channels (12, 15 and 23) could be something substantially more than the character generator that had been our only option from about 1993 to 2004. Now we have 2 fully functioning programmed channels (12, 23) and our own announcement channel and the capability to broadcast most of our public meetings. (See the article next page on ch. 15.)

As with the previous negotiations, we will join forces with our neighbors Deerfield and Sunderland to negotiate as a group to get the best possible terms. Again, this time we will enlist the services of Attorney Bill Solomon, who helped us negotiate such favorable terms last time around. One thing that will be different about the upcoming negotiations is that we now have Frontier Community Access TV (FCAT) as a



Land Trust, a frequent collaborator in many local land preservation efforts. In addition to providing invaluable technical assistance, FLT has maintained the WLP Whately Fund.

In an effort to simplify the accounting of donations and to keep in line with current non-profit organization accounting practices, WLP will no longer raise funds through annual membership contributions, and instead bestow free membership to everyone interested in supporting WLP's efforts.

Future fund-raising will be done specifically for individual preservation projects. Contributions can be made directly to FLT for each project and will continue to be tax deductible. Contributions to the Whately Fund will no longer be accepted. The existing balance will be used to fund upcoming Whately projects.

WLP 2013 desk calendars featuring artwork from Whately Elementary School students will soon be available. The calendar will be on sale at the Whately Library Handmade Holiday Fair on December 9, and then afterwards at the library front desk, along with WLP note cards.

communities - like Whately - which had adopted the full 3% CPA surcharge getting more than the 26.8% first round state match distribution. The town will get \$68,340 from the state.

Our CPA dollars can leverage a lot of additional outside money, above and beyond the state match. Last April's town meeting approved spending \$118,000 for four historic preservation projects and two agricultural preservation restrictions. The total value of the APR's was about \$790,000 more than the amount we voted, thanks to state funding and other local donations,

This year's match money along with the town's FY2013 CPA collections will be used to help fund projects which will be voted on at next year's town meeting. The projects must be for historic preservation, open space, community housing or recreation. (See the Forms page at whately.org for CPA application forms, which include eligibility criteria, or contact a CPC member.)

CPA project applications are due on Tuesday, December 11, to allow time for evaluation and a public hearing before warrant items are due in March. It is helpful if the project can be reviewed by the appropriate town commission (Ag, Conservation, Historical, or Recreation) before it is submitted. Town Clerk News

Street List – During the last week of December 2012, the 2013 Annual Street List forms will be sent to all households. Please verify the information, include all household residents including children, sign and date the form and return to the Town Clerk's Office by January 18th. There is a locked black mailbox outside the Town Clerk's office at the Center School Building at 218 Chestnut Plain Road for your use.

It is important that the town has a correct account of all residents because many of our assessments and grants are based on population and we must have accurate numbers so that we receive or are charged the correct amount of money.

Dog Licenses – The Town Clerk's Office will start issuing dog licenses on February 1, 2013. There will be an insert in the Street List envelope explaining the requirements to license your dogs. All dogs must receive a rabies vaccine and any dog six months old or older must be licensed per state law. See section below for new online payment availability. Late fees for not licensing your dog will go into effect on June 1, 2013.

Elections – The Annual Town Election will be held on Tuesday, June 11, 2013. Nomination papers for elected positions will be available on February 4, 2013. Visit www.whately.org for more information in the weeks to come or contact Lynn Sibley, Town Clerk at 665-0054.

New Services Now Available Online Vital Record and Dog License Requests

The Town Clerk now has an online system that will allow you to purchase dog licenses, birth, marriage and death certificates online. Much like the present system for paying real estate taxes on line, the Clerk's office offers you the opportunity to purchase your dog license from the comfort of your home. If the Clerk's office has a valid rabies certificate on record, you will be able to pay from your checkbook or with a credit card on line. Just go to www.whately.org and click on Online Payments. (Additional fees will apply to purchases made with a credit card). If you have a new dog or need to provide updated rabies information you will need to do the transaction by mail or in person.

Birth certificates will be available for those people whose parents were living in Whately at the time of their birth. Marriage certificates will be obtainable for those people who filed their marriage intentions in Whately, not necessarily that they lived or were married in Whately. Death certificates will be available for any person that died in Whately or was living in Whately at the time of their death. If you are unsure of these requirements please call the Clerk's office at 665-0054.

Connect CTY – Town Wide Notification System

When the town first purchased the Connect CTY system I never realized how much it would be used and what a vital service it provided to the residents. Using the system for updates on Tropical Storm Irene and for the October 29, 2011 snow storm we recognized how important

cell phone numbers are to the system. Residents who had corded phones and Verizon service were able to receive calls. Residents that used Comcast or had portable phones lost the service a few hours after the power went out. Cell phone service in general was up and running through most of the storm.

I encourage everyone to include their cell phone numbers in our Blackboard Connect CTY program. It is very simple to do. You can go to Whately.org, scroll down and click on "Sign on to Blackboard Connect CTY". It will ask you to set up an account. If you have another number as your primary number, your cell phone will not be called for routine messages. However if the message is of a critical nature such as the recent storm updates, the system is programmed to call all numbers. You may also call 665-4400 directly and we will input any numbers that you would like into the system.

I would also like to thank everyone for their positive comments regarding this phone notification system.
