WHATELY MILITARY SERVICE • Six new bronze plaques honoring Whately residents who served in times of war and peace will be dedicated in the Veterans Memorial Park following the Whately Grange's Memorial Day parade on Sunday, May 28, at 11 a.m. The new plaques recognize 345 men and women who

served between the French and Indian War and 2023, complementing the existing plaque that recognizes service in the two World Wars, Korea and Vietnam. Historical research and present-day documentation has been a team effort by Dereka Smith, Jim Ross, Larry Ashman and Neal Abraham. Funding for the project has been provided by the Community Preservation Act, the Town of Whately, and the Whately Veterans Committee.



#### **WHATELY MAY BE** RECOGNIZED AGAIN! What's up with possible **Postal Changes**

HOW WOULD YOU LIKE TO USE WHATELY, MA 01093 AS YOUR ADDRESS? IT CAN BECOME A REALITY.

Every resident in the Town of Whately has likely had a bad experience with the mail service and zip code situation in Whately.

West Whately 01039 residents get their mail through the Haydenville Post Office. East Whately residents get their mail through South Deerfield 01373. This situation has resulted in many difficulties.

- 1. Have you had a difficult time explaining to UPS or Fedex that you live in Whately, and they say that your address doesn't exist?
- 2. Have you called Comcast or Eversource to have the service installed and they said your address doesn't exist?
- 3. Have you tried to get a real ID at the RMV and have nothing that has your Whately address?
- 4. Have you registered to vote using your mailing address which resulted in your voter registration going to Deerfield and is rejected?
- 5. Have you looked up your voter registration status on the State Voter website using your



Mailing Address zip code and found you don't exist and thought you had to reregister?

- 6. Have you received a motor vehicle excise tax bill from Deerfield because the RMV used your mailing address rather than your physical address as the garaging location?
- 7. Did you have a difficult time answering your federal census because they said your address didn't exist?
- 8. Have you had mail "returned to sender" because you used the Whately 01093 address which they said didn't exist?
- 9. Have you become best friends with the Deerfield resident that has the same address as yours on River Road or North Street?

Well, the postal service may have a solution to these issues. In a meeting with the United States Postal Service and Congressman Jim McGovern's office, we explained the difficulties that people were having, especially with Real ID's and the postal service felt confident they could resolve these issues. The proposal is that each resident will be able to use their Street address with Whately, MA 01093 as

their address and the postal service will direct the mail internally to the correct post office for delivery. Your mail will be delivered by the same delivery system that you have now. Those that are using a Whately post office box will not need to make any changes.

In order for this change to be facilitated, each resident who currently uses the 01039 or 01373 zip codes will need to make address changes with the Post Office (which can be done online) and with all the companies with which you do business. Your forwarding order will be in effect for one year so that it gives you time to get all your address changes completed. This inconvenience in the beginning should result in smooth mail and package delivery in the future. Whately will get its identity back!



## Watts up! - Report from the town energy committee

1) **The UMass Clean Energy Extension Service** (UMCEES) will be tabulating the results from the energy survey that was mailed to everyone this spring to assess





Whately's (and other nearby towns) potential generating potential from photo-voltaic (solar) panels. This will help us develop a solar action plan, which would help the town and residents decide how to best develop our solar potential. (Survey and assessment conducted by UM faculty and grad students at no cost to the towns.) Our current timeline:

- Survey results to be presented the week of June 5<sup>th</sup>.
- UMCEES will develop community action plans for delivery to town by June 23.
- Town Solar Planning Committees will review the UM community action plans over the remaining summer weeks.
- Forums will be held late August into September where UM personnel will meet with individual towns and residents to discuss and finalize the solar assessment draft plan.
- 2) Frontier Energy Advisory Committee is a recently formed group of concerned citizens from the four towns who have recently come together to help FRHS achieve maximum energy efficiency. Consideration is currently focused on a "deep energy" audit of the buildings in order to pinpoint the most promising conservation and efficiency measures. **Preparedness** (MVP) action grant for a total of \$304,778 (August 2, 2022) plus matching funds (\$23,066) coming from the Coronavirus Local Fiscal Recovery Funds. It was decided to use the grant to fund a solar array on the roof of the town offices with a battery storage system, which would prevent freezing of the wet-sprinkler system in addition to keeping the building functional during power outages.

The deadline for submission of CPA applications for funding at a fall special town meeting is Tuesday, June 13 at noon at Town Offices. Email submissions to townclerk@whately.org are acceptable as long as the date and time on the email meet the deadline. These applications must be for timesensitive projects that cannot wait for funding at the 2024 annual town meeting. The applicant must be prepared to explain why the project is time sensitive.




The Community Preservation Committee considers applications for funding for eligible projects for community housing, historic preservation, open space and recreation. The CPC encourages applicants to discuss their projects with the Committee prior to the application deadline and to have received the approval of the relevant town committee(s) (Ag Commission, Conservation Commission, Housing Committee, Historical Commission, and Recreation Commission). 

You will see labeled 5 gallon buckets around, as well as bins ready to accept your food and paper waste. We are encouraging the



Composting is an essential part of mitigating climate change, supporting a healthy environment and fostering the cradle-to-cradle lifecycle of the products we use. When food is thrown out with the trash, it ends up in a landfill or incinerator where it increases greenhouse gases. We need to redirect food waste back to the earth, where it contributes

to healthy soil, fixing carbon and retaining water.

Of course, festivals aren't the only place where you can compost. Start a composting practice by keeping food scraps out of the trash, and set up a compost pile at home or bring your food waste to the transfer station (where they accept pretty much anything that comes from an animal or a plant, including meat scraps, bones, egg cartons, and much more).

Come to the Board of Health table to learn about composting best practices.

The Annual Town Election will be held on Tuesday June 13, 2023 at the Whately Town Offices, 4 Sandy Lane, from 10:00a.m. 7:00p.m. The election ballot will include the votes for Elected Town Officials. Registration of voters for the Town Election will be held June 2, 2023 from 9am - 11am and 3pm -5pm at the Town Offices. Early in person voting will be held June 5 - June 8, 9am-1pm. Absentee Ballots will be available starting May 23 for those who will be out of town, physically unable to make it to the Town Offices, or have religious reasons for not being able to vote Mail in applications for absentee that date. ballots must be received by Tuesday June 6, 2023. However, keep in mind that you must allow for the return of the ballot to the Town Clerk before the close of polls on Election Day.
