

Whately's Community Choice Power Supply Program Has Saved Town Residents Money Every Year

New Electricity Rates Starting January By the Whately Energy Committee

Thanks to the Town of Whately's "Community Choice Power Supply Program," Whately residents have have saved money on their electricity bill every month for the past 3 years (compared to Eversource's Residential Basic Service rate)!

Most Whately residents are already enrolled in the Community Choice Power Supply Program. You can check if you are by taking a look at your monthly bill from Eversource.

If the bill lists 'Dynegy' as your electricity supplier, you are already participating in this program. Dynegy supplies the electricity delivered to your home by Eversource, and when you pay your Eversource bill, Eversource reimburses Dynegy for the cost of the electricity supplied to you. If, however, your bill reads 'Basic Service', it means you opted out of the town program and are still paying Eversource to go out to bid to buy the electricity you use.

As you can see by looking at the chart included with this article, the cost of electric supply provided by Whately has remained locked-in at 9.43 cents/kWh since Jan 2021. The cost of Eversource Residential Basic Service started out at 10.7 cents/kWh in Jan 2021, rose to a high of 21.99 cents/kWh , and is currently to just over 16 cents/kWh. You might be saying, "Wait a minute, if I'm enrolled in the town program, why then is my actual bill more than 9.43 cents/kWh?"

This is because cost of producing the electricity you use — the *supply cost* — is only one part of your monthly Eversource electricity bill. Other parts cover the cost per kWh of delivering that electricity over Eversource's power lines to your house and the costs of necessary maintenance and repairs to those power lines, as well as a number of other smaller charges. Eversource bundles all of those charges together so that you have just one bill to pay each month.

The town of Whately voted to start this Community Choice Power Supply Program — also called a "Municipal Aggregation" program — in hopes of getting cheaper and green electricity than was otherwise available, so it is great news to see how well that plan has been working.

That said, savings are not guaranteed, so why has it worked so well so far? One important reason is that Whately has an advantage over Eversource when it comes to purchasing electricity.

When the town requests bids from electrical suppliers, it can choose not only the company that will produce the electricity offering the best possible rate, it can also chose to lock that rate for multiple years, guaranteeing that your price won't rise for the duration of the contract. It can also adjust when it goes out to bid to take better advantage of market conditions. In contrast, Eversource is required by the state to go out to bid every 6 months on a highly regulated schedule, and this means the price jumps every 6 months as well, sometimes by a large amount!

So what's new starting this January? Why are you getting postcards about new rates? The answer is that the three year contract that locked-in a standard supply rate of 9.43 cents/kWh ends this December, and a new contract starts this January. It will be no surprise to anyone who has seen how prices have risen over the past three years that the new negotiated rate that starts January 2024 will be higher than before: 14.35 cents/kWh for Whately's standard plan (or 15.64 cents/ kWh if you opt for 100% renewable energy from Massachusetts and New England).

Nobody likes a price increase, but there is still some good news about the new rates: (1) Whately's new Jan 2024 rates will still be cheaper than the Eversource's new Jan through July 2024 Basic Service rate of 15.88 cents/kWh (2) Whately's rates are guaranteed for 2 full years, and (3) you can opt-out at any time. If you should ever decide you would prefer to switch back to Eversource Basic Service, you can do for free at any time. Whately and Eversource never charge any fees to switch.

Colonial Power — the company that administers the Community Choice Power Supply Program for the town of Whately — is mailing out postcards the first week of December announcing the rate change.

In keeping with our town mandate, the new standard service won't just be cheaper than Eversource Residential Basic Service this January, it will be greener too! Whately's new standard service will purchase 5% more of its electricity from new, local, carbonemission free sources than is required by the state. You don't need to do anything to get this if you are already in the town program. Whately also offers two alternatives to this standard (default) service for its Community Choice customers. The first of the alternatives offered by Whately — the optional National Green program — invests in renewable energy credits (REC) from older, already existing wind farms spread out across the country instead of in new Massachusetts produced renewable energy.

The National Green (100% wind) option used to be significantly cheaper than other options, so last time around, the town chose to make it the default option. This time around however, there is only a 0.05 cent/ kWh difference, and the town chose to make the program that invested more in new, locally produced wind, water, and solar based renewable energy its default offer. If you prefer the National Green option, follow the instructions on the postcard in your mail.

The second of the two alternatives offered by Whately is the New England Green option. This option maximizes the amount of your electricity that comes from new, local, carbon-emission free sources. It is the greenest option available, yet it is still cheaper than what you would pay for electricity under Eversource Basic Service. starting this January. If you would prefer this option, follow the instructions on the postcard you receive in the mail. Alternatively, you can sign up at <u>colonialpowergroup.com/whately</u> once that website is updated to reflect the new rates.

It is important to note that we don't yet know what the price of Eversource Basic Service will be for the 2nd half of 2024 or either half of 2025, so even though we've had success so far, future savings cannot be guaranteed. That depends on what happens to the cost of electricity in the future. Our guess is the market cost of electricity will continue to rise over time — what's your prediction? — but if you ever decide you would prefer to switch to Eversource Basic Service, remember that you can do so at any time for free. To opt out of the town program, you guessed it, follow the instructions on the postcard in the mail!

RECENT ACQUISITIONS • Rose Mary and Robert Badovinac of Northglenn, CO, tracked down the Whately Historical Society to donate a **scrapbook** (WHS 2023.158.001) assembled by William H. Brown (1866–1924), a well-known silent film actor. His Whately parents were Henry Augustus Brown (1837–1913) and Caroline Belden (1838–1915). Henry Brown attained the highest military rank of any Whately soldier who served in the Union Army, and the scrapbook contains memorials to



him and Caroline Belden Brown, as well as an intact Whately Centennial Programme of July 4, 1871.

A primitive antique **foot warmer**, which probably dates to the 1820s, would have been used by travelers in horse-drawn wagons. Its wood frame and

turned balustrade-style supports are constructed with mortise and tenon, and its decorated punched-tin sides allowed heat to filter through from the tin bucket inside, which would have been stoked with hot coals. The handle and door latch are simple wire devices. Donated by Judy Markland, the foot warmer was found in the attic of 106 North Street. (WHS 2023.019.001)



Top hats were the mark of elegance in the 19th and early 20th centuries, and this example, made around 1910, belonged to Albert Ernest Graves (1863–1932). The hat (WHS 2023.136.001) was made by the Knox Hat Company at 216 Broadway in Lower Manhattan, which was in business from 1838 to 1932. Knox's Brooklyn factory was the largest hat factory in the



Mental Health Clinicians to Respond with Whately Police

Thanks to a regional grant, the Whately, Sunderland, and Hatfield Police Departments, along with the CSO organization (Clinical & Support Options in Greenfield and Northampton) have partnered together to share a mental health clinician co-responder. This clinician is employed by CSO, and will respond to mental health or substance abuse related calls along with specially trained police officers within the three communities. All costs associated with this program are grant funded. The benefit of a co-response program stems from diverse skill sets

between Law Enforcement & CSO. Pairing them together will give the residents of Whately, Sunderland & Hatfield more options for treatment or diversion when faced with a mental health crisis, while reducing the stigma associated with them. The clinician will ride with an officer three days a



week (1 shift per town), and will be available 24/7 to deal with individuals experiencing a mental health or substance abuse related crisis. 
Whately again receives 100% state match for town CPA revenues.

CPA funding applications due December 12.

The Community Preservation Committee is delighted to report that Whately was one of only 8 communities in Massachusetts to get a 100% match for our local fy22 CPA revenue collections. The match amount from the state was \$100,799. We anticipate receiving





roughly \$200,000 in state and local CPA revenues for the current fiscal year.

The project funding cycle for Community Preservation Act funding at the spring annual town meeting starts on December 12 at 2:30pm, when project applications are due at Town Offices. Email submissions to townclerk@whately.org are acceptable as long as the time on the email meets the deadline.

To qualify for CPA funding, projects must be for historic preservation, open space, community housing or recreation. It is helpful if the project can be reviewed by the appropriate town commission (Ag, Conservation, Historical, Housing or Recreation) before it is submitted to the CPC. Application forms, sample applications, and a link to an explanation of project eligibility can also be found via the CPC page at whately.org.

Since the CPA was adopted in 2009, Whately has generated \$2.2 million in CPA funds for town projects, 49% of this from the state match. The town has approved \$1.8 million in spending for a wide variety of CPAfunded projects, including funds for rehabilitation of Town Hall, accessibility improvements at Herlihy Field, purchase of Agricultural Preservation Restrictions, cemetery improvements, rehabilitation of the Veterans Memorial, and expansion of the

hockey rink. (The full project list can be found on the CPC page at whately.org.) Our CPA funds also helped generate another \$3.8 million in state grants and private donations for various projects, so the total investment in Whately has been over \$5.5 million.


Like our regional public health colleagues, we want to remind our residents to keep healthy this holiday season. While the level of respiratory disease is lower than this time last year, the Flu, COVID, and RSV continue to circulate and may increase as winter goes on.

Here are actions you can take now to help keep you and your loved ones healthy:

• Get vaccinated! Flu, COVID, and RSV vaccines are available

• Take an ounce of prevention: wash your hands often with soap, avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth where viruses enter your body, avoid close contact with people who are sick, improve indoor air quality by using ventilation and/or filtration

 \cdot Take a COVID test if you have symptoms or have been exposed to someone with COVID. If you test positive for COVID, stay home for the first 5 days and mask days 6





through 10.

Transfer Station news

Annual Holiday Reminder – Recycle or Compost it! - You can recycle or compost much of your holiday trash free at the Whately transfer station! See what to recycle below. Town recycling and food waste composting are open to all residents, even if you have a private trash hauler. Remaining rubbish can be disposed of in Whately town bags for just \$2.50 per bag for 10 pack at the transfer station – a great deal!

You can recycle cardboard and paperboard boxes; greeting cards and wrapping paper (except those with foil, metallic inks, wire, button batteries or glitter); catalogues, calendars, and clean, dry plastic bags. Tape and paper shopping/gift bags are also OK with any type of handle. We also take Christmas trees for chipping after the holidays.

Please DO NOT recycle these **items**: ribbons, bows, and tinsel (reuse 'em), holiday lights, bubble wrap, packing peanuts (drop at UPS store) and Styrofoam; foil giftwrapping; blister pack, or old glossy photos.

Clothing & Textiles are recyclable too.



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Whately residents have long had an option to drop clothing, shoes, etc. in the Salvation Army box at the transfer station. Any clothing (shirts, sweaters, pants) to footwear (sneakers, sandals, cleats) to accessories (bags, belts, hats) to linens (sheets, towels, fabric, and more) can be accepted. These items can be torn, stained, out of style, or missing a mate, but they **must be CLEAN**, **DRY and in a plastic bag**.

Thanks to Bulky Day Volunteers. On Oct. 21, the transfer station hosted the fall bulky waste collection. We recycled and collected tons of bulky items with help from our bulky day volunteer crew and town highway staff. Compost and Recycle New Year's Resolutions for 2024! Our transfer station still offers one of the best and cheapest options to get rid of your trash, recyclables, and food waste. Street List - During the first week of January 2024, Annual Street List forms will be sent to all households. Please verify the information, sign and date the form and return to the Town Clerk's Office within 10 days of receipt. It is important that the town has a correct count of all residents because many of our assessments and grants are based on population and we must have accurate numbers so that we receive or are charged the correct amount of money. An informational insert will be included in your 2024 census mailing in regard to election location changes, 2024 dog licenses, and a 2024 vote by mail application will be included in your 2024 census mailing.

Dog Licenses – The Town Clerk's Office will start issuing dog licenses on February 5, 2024. There will be an insert in the Street List envelope explaining the requirements to license your dogs. All dogs must receive a rabies vaccine and any dog six months old or



older must be licensed per state law. Late fees of \$50 for not licensing your dog will go into effect on June 1, 2024.

2024 Town Meeting & Elections – ****All Election Day voting will be held at our Town Hall, 194 Chestnut Plain Road. Early Voting days will be held at our Town Offices, 4 Sandy Lane.***

- March 5th is Super Tuesday for the Presidential Primaries. The registration deadline for the primaries will be Feb. 23rd.
- Annual Town Meeting will be held in April (date and time TBD)
- Annual Town Election will be held on June 11, 2024. The registration deadline for the Town Election will be May 31. Nomination papers for the Annual Town Election will be available starting February 18, 2024.
- September 5th will be the State Primary Elections. The registration deadline to vote will be August 23rd.
