

The original castiron plow, a vast improvement from the wood plows in common use at the time, was based on principles of Thomas Jefferson and designed by Joel Nourse and his son Joel Nourse Jr. of Worcester in the 1840s.

Childhood in Whately 1771-1950 • How did Whately children work, play and learn in times past? Enjoy our array of photographs, games, toys, books, and costumes through the mid-20th century, and learn about the challenges of childbirth and infant mortality in the 18th and 19th centuries.

A tiny headstone in Center Cemetery marks the grave of Harry, who lived for 4 months and 4 days in 1871. His family name remains a mystery, but he was clearly loved by those who marked his grave with the carving of a peapod above his name.

We're always happy when we hear from folks with family ties in Whately, as we often learn as much from them as they learn from us! This summer has been no exception. Deborah Goodsite of New Jersey, has traced her roots to Englishman Philip Smith (1633–1685) of Hadley (which became Hatfield, then Whately) through Adna Smith (1760–1845), whose daughter Lydia was Deborah's 5th great-grandmother. Deborah helped untangle the complex history of the many Smith families in Whately and was pleased to see so many Smiths' names on the plaques commemorating Whately resi-



dents who fought in the Revolutionary War and joined the Honorable Shays's Rebellion. And Pam Williams of Colorado, whose 6th great-grandfather Adonijah Taylor (1728–1814) built the first mill


in Whately, was delighted to find the records and photos of Whately Glen that we've collected.

A more recent Whately resident, Julia Ann Parzick Kokernak, returned to town after 60 years away in central Mass.! She grew up on her grandparents' farm, Laurel Acres, on Haydenville Road, and brought many mementoes and photos of her family's time here. Ann was valedictorian of her eighth-grade class at the East Whately School in 1954.

First a reminder: Public Health Clinics are open in the Town Hall, every 2nd and 4th Tuesday of the month, no appointments necessary.

Vaccines, Flu, and Fall 2024

Your public health nurse and our local public health officials are gearing up for the cold flu season. This year we expect a rise in flu cases with a possible resurgence of COVID-19 variants. Cold/flu season can present significant challenges to people, particularly for high-risk populations, the elderly, young children, and those with underlying health conditions.

Here is what individuals and communities can do to prepare for a healthy autumn.

1) **Vaccination** remains one of the most effective strategies to prevent the spread of infectious diseases. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends that everyone aged six months and older

receive an annual flu shot and Covid-19 vaccines including boosters. Vaccinations should take place by the end of October for maximum protection over the holiday period when cold/flu/Covid transmission typically increases. We in public health are working to ramp up vaccination campaigns, emphasizing communication strategies that encourage vaccinations among hesitant groups.

2) **Cold and Flu prevention** strategies are important too,

4) **Build Community Resilience** by attending locally sponsored Educational Workshops and Pop-up Clinics.

5) Help maintaining Support Systems/ networks for those facing barriers in accessing healthcare, like transportation and languages. Our Senior Center and Valley Neighbors are good organizations to start with whether you are needing support or have support to offer.





The Town of Whately received an MVP (Municipal Vulnerability Preparedness)





Action Grant award in the amount of \$82,542 for our project entitled:The Future Looks Like Whately: Planting Resilience through Nature-Based Solutions.

We are excited to partner with pollinatorfocused design studio Landscape Interactions on a town-wide initiative to improve the resilience of landscapes and waterways to the impacts of climate change using nature-based solutions. Three Town-owned parcels will be selected as demonstration sites for biodiversity-centered landscape designs that will maximize the benefits of native plant communities to address some of Whately's top climate hazards while supporting native pollinator species at risk of local extinction.

This is a very busy year for elections. We just finished Early Vote by Mail and Early Voting in Person for the Sept. 3rd Primary. For the Nov. 5th State Election, you will be offered the same opportunities to vote. The last day to register to vote to be eligible to vote in the November 5th election is Oct. 26th. The Town Clerk's Office will be open that day from 9:00am-11:00am and 3:00pm- 5:00p.m. If you are already registered there is no need to register again.

Early Voting by Mail - The Secretary of the Commonwealth's Office will be sending out another round of Vote Early by mail applications for the Nov. 5th election in mid-Sept. for those that have not chosen to Vote by Mail for the election yet. If you had already sent in an application and indicated that you wanted a ballot for the Nov. election or all elections this year, you will not receive another application. Early vote ballots will start to be sent out to all voters who have applied as soon as I receive them which should be the end of Sept. or the beginning of Oct. All applications for the Nov. 5th election must be in the Town Clerk's office by 5 p.m. on Nov.
